UNITED WAY READERS

ONGOING

United Way Readers matches a caring volunteer with a student who struggles with their reading. Volunteers will be paired one-on-one with students to read together weekly throughout the academic year with the ultimate goal of improving the child's literacy skills.



VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE (VITA) JANUARY - APRIL

The VITA campaign offers free tax preparation and filing for eligible families. Volunteers will commit to four hours a week throughout the tax season, helping hardworking families claim every tax credit and refund they have earned.

AT THE WORKPLACE PROJECTS AND TEAM BUILDING OPPORTUNITIES

United Way partners with workplaces to offer employees the opportunity to make a difference without leaving the office by bringing projects to you. These projects offer a valuable team building opportunity while making an impact for local individuals, children and families. The United We Care kits listed below can be done from the safety of a volunteer's home or workplace. Costs are associated with these projects. Select from any of the following project offerings and team building enhancements:

Literacy Kits (Grades K-4)

Volunteers create props, games and/or activities to accompany books that help to deepen reading experiences for local children and build home libraries. Completed kits are donated to children enrolled in United Way-supported education programs.

Time commitment: Volunteers assemble two kits per hour on average.

Literacy Kits (Grades 5-8)

Volunteers create kits that will include grade appropriate books, toiletries and products for older students. Completed kits are donated to children enrolled in United Way-supported education programs.

Time commitment: Volunteers assemble two kits per hour on average.

Emergency Preparedness Kits

Volunteers build Family Emergency Preparedness Kits with supplies (e.g., non-perishable snacks, flashlight, whistle, first-aid kit, wipes) and learn how to create and practice a disaster preparedness plan. The kits will focus on risk prevention and awareness. Time commitment: Volunteers assemble 8-10 kits per hour on average.

STEM Kits

Volunteers build or assemble kits that focus on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. Kits will include a NEW STEM-themed book, experiment supplies and instructions, as well as other resources.

Outreach Kits

Volunteers assemble kits used by shelter partners to help with homeless outreach. Kits include items like healthy snacks, socks, gloves, hats and toiletry items. Completed kits are donated to people in United Way-supported emergency shelter programs.

Time commitment: Volunteers assemble eight to ten kits per hour on average.

SEASONAL OFFERINGS

Back to School Kits

Volunteers assemble kits that include a backpack, school supplies, information on the importance of regular school attendance and free enrichment programs and an inspirational note or bookmark made by the volunteer. Completed kits benefit children enrolled inUnited Waysupported school programs.

Time commitment: Volunteers assemble five to eight kits per hour on average.

Summer Supply Kits

Volunteers assemble kits that help children stay healthy and on track academically over the summer. Kits include healthy snacks and meal options, books and summer learning activities. Completed kits are donated to children in United Way-supported school programs. Time commitment: Volunteers assemble eight to ten kits per hour on average.

Family Necessities Kits

Family Necessities Kits include essential items that help children achieve academic milestones and stock homes with essential items that keep people healthy.

Time commitment: Volunteers can assemble 4-5 kits per hour on average.

Price is customizable based on Sponsor requests or needs. Price is subject to change to reflect added supplies.

NOTE: For projects with more than 250 kits, only the following options are available: literacy and outreach.

TEAM BUILDING ENHANCEMENTS AND ONE-TIME VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

TEAM BUILDING ENHANCEMENTS

In addition to facilitating a kit project on-site at your workplace, United Way can add team building enhancements that provide employees with a deeper opportunity to connect with one another while making an impact. Team building enhancements includes:

- Educational Awareness Activities related to financial stability, education and food insecurity;
- Team Building Activities that encourage communication and collaboration;
- Making Choices activity prompts participants to make tough choices on childcare, housing, transportation and career based on the monthly budget of a family living below the ALICE Household Survival Budget;
- Food for Thought A remote challenge that offers a real-life, week-long food budget that demonstrates the importance of access to affordable and healthy food;
- Competition to help spark group engagement; and,
- an Impact Speaker, where United Way staff arranges for a speaker to come on-site to your project and explain the impact of the activity.
